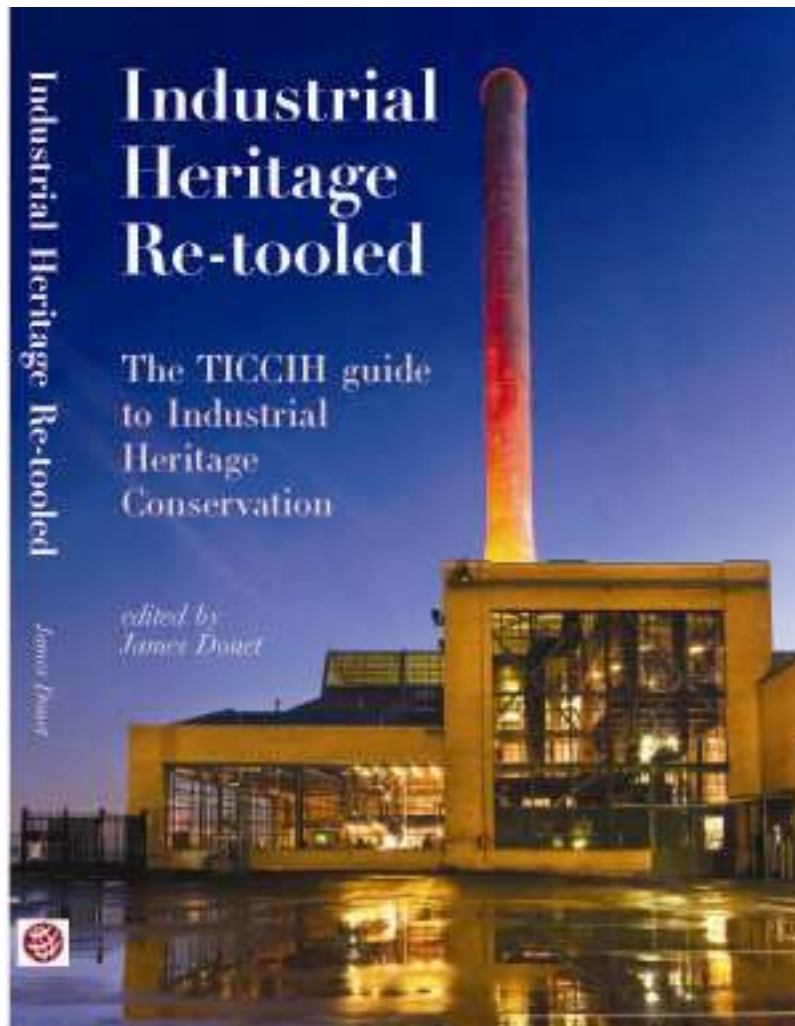


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## **Industrial Heritage Re-tooled: The TICCIH guide to Industrial Heritage Conservation**
