Domino Sugar Refinery

Friday, May 9, 2003 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Domino Sugar was a highly sought tour site for the Brooklyn SIA conference and American Sugar Refining is welcoming us back! Portions of this historic waterfront refinery date to 1884 and we will see both active processing of liquid sugar and the historic power plant. The tour will last two to three hours. Attendees must sign a liability waiver and wear appropriate safety gear including hardhats. Bring a flashlight to better view abandoned areas of the plant. Group size is limited to 30 and preference will be given to those who volunteered for the Brooklyn conference but were unable to attend the earlier tour. (If you've been there, please do not register.) Register by phone or e-mail to Mary and she will send a waiver and further instructions to you.

High Line

Wednesday, May 28, 2003 1:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

On May 28, Friends of the High Line (FHL) will host a tour of the Manhattan rail viaduct they are valiantly trying to save. There is currently a competition underway to design a park for the deck and we will discuss this on the tour. Group size is limited to 10 individuals due to CSX restrictions. Priority will be given to Chapter officers and the remaining spaces will be filled by drawing names from a hat. If you would like your name in the drawing, contact Mary by phone or email by May 14th. She will notify you one week before the tour if you have won a spot.

Note that accessing the High Line without CSX permission is illegal, and threatens FHI's working relationship with CSX, which in turn may threaten their long-term ability to open

the Line to full and complete public access. Help save the High Line and open it to the public: Don't trespass.

Summary of the Annual Meeting, January 25, 2003

President Paul Bartczak called the meeting to order at 12:45. After announcing his retirement from the Chapter presidency, he gave a review of Chapter activities in 2002:

- January 19 Annual meeting at Drew University.
- **June 6-10** National SIA meeting in Brooklyn sponsored by our chapter was a rousing success.
- **July 21** Second Annual Chapter Sail on fireboat John J. Harvey traveled to the Kill van Kull and other areas around Staten Island.
- August 11 The tour of the passenger ferry Yankee with onboard barbecue had low attendance. The boat served as both a Liberty Island ferry and a Block Island ferry.
- **September 21** Intrepid members traveled to Bannerman's Island by canoe for a tour of the "castle," once a military surplus depot, and then went on to Croton-on-Hudson for the annual corn roast at the home of Gerry Weinstein and Mary Habstritt.
- October 17 to 20 The national fall tour of the SIA was in our area this year, visiting many sites in the Lehigh Valley that have been toured by the Chapter in years gone by.
- October 22 Consolidated Edison Waterside Steam Generating Plant near 5th Avenue and \$1st Street in Manhattan was toured by a small number of Chapter members at the invitation of the local community board. Interest far exceeded the limit on group size.

Drew Symposium

After various announcements, the date of the next Drew Symposium was set for October 25, 2003.

The election of officers was held. Tom Flagg announced the slate of candidates, all of whom ran unopposed and were elected:

Mary then made a few remarks, beginning by thanking Paul for his leadership contributions. She also thanked Charles and Aron for serving again and recognized Tom for working on nominations and on the Drew Symposium.

She then presented ideas for upcoming tours. She hopes to take advantage of contacts made for the Brooklyn conference and arrange tours of the Domino sugar refinery, among other sites. She is discussing co-sponsoring tours with the Brooklyn Historical Society. Michigan Tech, site of SIA's national headquarters, has a team of graduate students working on the West Point Foundry in Cold Spring, New York again this summer. They are interested in getting the Chapter involved at the site.

The Brooklyn conference attracted over 300 attendees and we showed them a really good time. Books are not yet closed, but it looks like we netted about \$20,000, which will be split with the Chapter. The annual meeting is intended as an educational event, not a fundraiser, but we exceeded our expectations on attendance, planning our budget to break even at only 225.

Now that the work of planning the conference is past Mary hopes to return to pending projects, including the Chapter website. Joe Macasek has been asked to design a Chapter logo as part of this effort.

She asked for approval of the Roebling Award committee (see call for nominees elsewhere in this newsletter): Ed Rutsch, Mike Raber, and Mary Habstritt. A majority of members did so.

19 people were dropped for not renewing since 2000

We then viewed four slide presentations: Tom Flagg showed photographs of rooftop water tanks. Aron Eisenpress presented images from the Lehigh Valley fall tour. Bierce Riley reviewed a summer trip up the Hudson River on the John J. Harvey fireboat. Fred Heide showed documentation of the restoration of the 20th Century Limited's "Hickory Tree" salon car.

The meeting ended at about 4:30.

ROEBLING AWARD Call for Nominations

The first annual John Augustus Roebling Award for Contributions to Industrial Archeology will be awarded at the 2003 Drew Symposium on October 25th. The Award committee seeks your nominations.

The award is intended to recognize an individual, group, or organization that has made an outstanding contribution to documenting or preserving the industrial heritage of the greater New York-New Jersey area. The honoree will receive a cash award of \$250 and a certificate.

Nominees must have displayed an extraordinary effort to save or preserve a site of industrial or engineering interest, or created unique or outstanding documentation through archeological research, photography, written history, or other means that provides a record of such a site. Nominees are not required to be Roebling Chapter members. Individuals who are nominated must be living.

Williamsburg Bridge 100th Birthday Celebration

June 22, 2003 What Time????

When it was completed in 1903, the Bridge, with a 1600-ft. span, was the longest suspension bridge in the world. Instrumental in creating the cultural diversity of New York, the "immigrant bridge" has long served diverse populations moving out of Manhattan to seek a better life in Brooklyn.

The Brooklyn Arts Council (BAC) and The Daily News invite you to participate in the Williamsburg Bridge 100th Birthday Celebration on Sunday, June 22, 2003 from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00p.m. at Continental Army Plaza Park and along Roebling to Grand St. in Williamsburg, Brooklyn. The day-long celebration will feature a flatbedsized birthday cake topped with a model of the Bridge; engineers and historians leading walking tours of the Bridge; children's educational bridge-building activities; a music stage celebrating the local community with merengue tipico, klezmer, son, and music of the giglio; a Bridge photo exhibit; storytelling sessions; and more.
