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### Itasca Historical Depot Project

### B. Project Summary

The Village of Itasca was founded by Dr. Elijah J. Smith in 1843 and in 1873 he donated land to the railroad for its right-of-way through Itasca and \$400 for the construction of the Itasca railway station. In 1873, the Itasca Depot was built by A.G. Chessman. It served as a passenger/freight station until 1976. In 1976 it was moved 864 feet to its current location. After the move, the only known changes made to the original structure are the addition of a bathroom, staircase to access the attic, minor roof replacement and the addition of a ventilation system. The Itasca Depot now serves as a museum dedicated to collecting and preserving information specific to the history of Itasca and it is run through the collaborative efforts between the Itasca Historical Society, Itasca Park District and the Village of Itasca.

Over the years, the structure has begun to deteriorate and is in desperate need of repair and restoration. A year ago, the artifacts were removed; so that the structure could be assessed and a plan developed for capital improvements. In order to move forward, a capital plan was put into place for the Itasca Depot. Phase I, was the construction of a 20 car parking lot adjacent to the Itasca Depot. Phase II is an over \$750,000 proposed project, which addresses the desperate need to restore the integrity of the historical 138 year-old Itasca Depot structure; so that it can continue to serve in the future as the host to the public Itasca Historical Depot Museum.

The primary objective of the proposed project is to repair and restore the Itasca Depot back to its original 1873 state and make it a place where the Itasca and the Milwaukee Railroad's past and present come together for visitors to interact and learn. It includes: compliance to the over 26 building and fire code violations; installation of ADA accessible walkways, doorways and washroom; replacement of electrical, plumbing and mechanical systems; replacement in kind of wood floors, ceiling, windows, bead board, doors, trim and siding; exterior site development; and the installation of permanent lighted display cases and a feature interactive display focused on Itasca and the Milwaukee Railway.

Specifically, this grant request from the Society of Industrial Archeology-Industrial Heritage Preservation Grant is to assist with funding the preservation/restoration/replacement of the wooden depot doors. This specific portion of the project targets matching the original 1873 locations and door sizes, for the original passenger and freight doors. The estimated costs for this targeted portion of the project are \$40,737.

### C. Application Narrative

1. Documentation of need for the Project: what is the proposed project's significance to industrial heritage?

The Village of Itasca was founded by Dr. Elijah J. Smith in 1843, after his application to buy 80 acres of land at \$1.25 an acre from the federal government was approved. Over the following years other families moved in and established farms and a cheese factory. From the 1840s to the 1870s, it took one to two days to travel from the Itasca area to Chicago. Then, the Chicago and Pacific railroad began planning to lay tracks from Chicago to Savanna, IL (on the Mississippi). There was much competition in DuPage County as to where the line should go, and Dr. Smith donated land to the railroad for its right-of-way through Itasca. In addition, he donated \$400 for the construction of the Itasca railway station. In 1873, the Itasca Depot was built by A.G. Chessman ("son of Itasca's second family").

After the railroad came, the journey was cut down to one hour, which made Itasca an important location in the Chicago area. In 1880, after the Chicago & Pacific railroad went bankrupt, the railroad was acquired by the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad. From 1880-1985, the track was the main line west out of Chicago, through Itasca and going from there through lowa, Missouri, Omaha, Nebraska and Kansas City and to Rapid City, SD. It carried not only high speed passenger trains and freight trains, but, in the hay day of railroading, there were 17 major trunk lines in the United States, and The Milwaukee Road Railroad was one of the 17. This railroad was not only important to Itasca, but also important to the whole country.

The Itasca Historical Depot Museum was founded in 1976 by members of the Itasca Historical Society who organized to save the Itasca Depot from demolition, after a new station was built. It was moved 864 feet to its current location on November 9, 1976 and had a Grand Opening on September 6, 1981. After the move, the only known changes made to the original structure are the addition of a bathroom, staircase to access the attic, minor roof replacement and the addition of a ventilation system. The Itasca Depot now serves as a museum dedicated to collecting and preserving information specific to the history of Itasca and it is run through the collaborative efforts between the Itasca Historical Society, Itasca Park District and the Village of Itasca.

In 2006, the Milwaukee Road Historical Association, Inc (MRHA) contacted the Village of Itasca to discuss the vintage "Itasca Depot" building and shed light on what a "jewel" the building is and that it is one of the oldest existing depots in the state of Illinois and West. MRHA offered assistance with helping to restore and preserve the building and bring train exhibits into the Itasca Depot. In October 2009, a newly structured Museum Agreement was adopted and two new partners officially joined the existing collaborative efforts: Itasca Community Library and the Milwaukee Road Historical Association, Inc. In order to move forward, a capital plan was put into place for the Depot Museum. Phase I, was the construction of a 20 car parking lot adjacent to the Itasca Depot. Phase II is the proposed project, which addresses the desperate need to

restore the integrity of the historical 138 year-old Itasca Depot structure; so that it can continue to serve in the future as the host to the public museum.

Conclusively, this project is about preserving the history of Itasca and the Railway. Itasca only exists because the railway was placed going through the village. The development of the railway changed the United States and the ability for travel and trade. It changed the entire industry of the United States. This Depot was vital to moving of freight and passengers and creating and moving industry. It is one of the oldest and last standing and once the project is complete it will be a testament to our past; not only the history of Itasca, but the rail road too.

Specifically, grant funds are being requested to go towards the restoration of the passenger/freight door restoration/location. Attached are current photos and original photos of the Itasca Depot. Restoring this Depot will be a tribute to all.

### 2. What research methods will you employ?

The research for this project started with photos of the original Itasca Depot, which are owned by the Itasca Historical Society. We have photos of all side of the Itasca Depot, showing what the windows and passenger/freight doors looked like when the Itasca Depot was built in 1873.

There are several resources which have been contacted to assist us in determining how to restore the Itasca Depot and with what methods; these include: Itasca Historical Society, Milwaukee Road Historical Association, Inc., Itasca Community Library, Illinois Historic Preservation Agency, Illinois Department of Natural Resources. Currently, contact has been made with the Illinois Historic Preservation Office to discuss the historical significance of the Itasca Depot, the potential of could it go on the National Registry of Historical Places, and direction on the standards to be used to restore the Itasca Depot.

The architect is from FGM Architects and they have contracted to work with a preservation architect to help us determine the "in-kind" materials to be used and confirm the authenticity of how to restore the building within the Secretary of Interior's Guidelines.

### 3. Who is responsible for your project?

Maryfran Leno is the person ultimately responsible for all aspects of this project. She is the Executive Director of the Itasca Park District, and is ultimately responsible for the planning, budget, funding and project itself. She is supported by the above stated persons, who will assist with reviewing proposals and collectively assist in making the decisions.

The Itasca Park District is a local tax-exempt government body, which provides park and recreational services to the community. They are taking the lead on this entire project and have support from the following core groups: Village of Itasca, Itasca Community Library, Itasca Historical Society, Itasca historical Commission and the Milwaukee Road Historical Association, Inc.

### 4. What tangible products do you expect to produce with this project?

This is a capital project; therefore, the most prominent tangible end of project evidence will be the 138 year-old restored Itasca Depot. Throughout the project, we will document the progress through taking photos. Architectural plans, renditions, reports and marketing materials will be kept by the Itasca Park District and all this information and photos will be stored/archived with the Itasca Community Library and on the World Wide Web for all to access.

Once completed, the Itasca Depot will act as the home to the Itasca Historical Depot Museum. A place where the history of Itasca and the Railway will be portrayed and open to the public to explore and learn.

### D. Budget

The overall project budget is \$775,304.

The funding sources are coming from several different avenues:

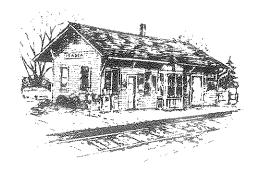
