<p>In December 2012 the Preservation Trust of Vermont purchased the Vermont Marble Museum and its collection in order to save the museum from closing and its collection from being sold piecemeal. The Trust has an option and is fundraising to purchase the Vermont Marble Company Finishing Shed that houses the museum. The Preservation Trust of Vermont, through the Town of Proctor, is applying for a Community Development Planning Grant to do measured drawings and complete an engineering assessment. A grant from the Society of Industrial Archeology would help pay for measured drawings and serve as match for the Community Development Planning Grant.</p> <p>The finishing shed is a physical landmark in the center of Proctor, a company town created in 1886 by a legislative act. Vermont Marble Company was the largest marble company in the world. Proctor marble became the material of choice for many monumental buildings throughout the United States and in Washington DC. In 1891, Vermont Marble Company Founder, Redfield Proctor, became a U.S. Senator for Vermont and chairman of the Senate committee that awarded construction contracts. In this position, he helped ensure that many government buildings were built of Vermont marble.</p>
